You may have seen in the varying media spaces that attendance at school has become a major focus for our government. They have implemented a campaign entitled 'Every school day is a bia day!' The focus is to raise awareness about our tamariki attending school every day, as currently in New Zealand almost half of our tamariki don't regularly attend school. For us at Auckland Point School this has always been a priority and you may have been called at some point if your child was absent and we hadn't heard from you. This system continues every day and it is our job to ensure that we know why tamariki are not at school if they dont arrive. It is a parent/caraiver's legal responsibility to ensure that their school gae children attend school every day unless they are too sick to attend or there are other valid reasons for absence. By working together we can ensure that your tamariki are getting the best out of every day a school. 




# PB4L FOCUS Weeks 3 & 4 **Showing Kindness**
